Bertrand said the province was troubled with the results of the audit, but would not elaborate on what it found other than to say Osborne House was struggling to meet its budget and there had been staff and client complaints about

"I'm surprised they resigned," she said. "I'd hoped they'd remain in place and we could work through these issues."

But Osborne House board members paint a different picture of what went wrong.

Board member Cathy Gaudry said the board welcomed the audit and was willing to work to improve the situation, but received no co-operation from government officials. She acknowledged the board struggled to maintain its budget, but said the government did not do its

Gaudry noted new contracts were negotiated in 2000 with two unions representing about 50 staff. The contracts called for salary increases ranging from two to 2.3 per cent per year to

The shelter's budget could not accommodate the raises, Gaudry said.

'The government negotiated those increases but we couldn't fund them and they refused to do so," she said.

As a result, the shelter has a salary deficit of

Board members have been fundraising on their own — even bagging groceries at Safeway — and have raised \$90,000 this year. But Gaudry said that money should be used to pay

for improved services at the shelter, not to fund salary shortfalls.

Gaudry said the board was never notified of any staff or client complaints about services

or programming. In October, the board asked the province to enter into mediation to try to resolve the issues.

The government declined the offer. Most recently, Gaudry said, the province withheld the shelter's funding in December, leaving the board wondering if it was going to be able to meet payroll this month. The funding eventually arrived, but Gaudry said she

en the board. "We had staff members, at Christmas time, not knowing if they were going to get paid or not," she said.

"We felt bullied, abused and threatened by them.'

Deputy Tory family services critic Myrna Driedger said the resignations add to the growing list of problems in the department.

The Family Services Department has been under scrutiny of late as a result of a number of scandals, including allegations of misspending of \$1.5 million at Hydra House, a social agency for disabled children and adults, and more than \$1 million in financial mismanagement at Aiyawin Corp., an aboriginal housing agency.

"They're going from one crisis to another," she said. "They're not managing these situations well.

Gaudry said the Osborne House problem highlights the need for a public inquiry into the

ity back on track. The remaining board members will begin a recruitment campaign to replenish their ranks.

Osborne House is the largest of 10 abuse shelters in Manitoba. This year, the facility will receive about \$1.2 million in provincial funding. It serves about 3,000 women and children each year through shelter or crisis support.


